


Next steps





How to help your child with National 5 Applications of Maths

What is National 5 Applications of Maths?

The National 5 Applications of Mathematics course consists of three units:-

- Geometry and Measure
- Managing Finance and Statistics
- Numeracy

Assessments take place throughout the school year.

All units are assessed in the external exam in May.

Paper 1— 1 hour 5 minutes (45 marks)

Paper 2—2 hours (65 marks)

A calculator is allowed in Paper 2.

Study

The course is assessed throughout the year.

This means that study should be regular—little and often.

Tips on studying:-

- To study maths you need to do maths—showing all your working
- Look over class work
- Do past paper questions and use the SQA marking schemes
- Re-do homework exercises
- Use websites (see section on resources)
- Attend Supported Study sessions in the Maths department (see section on resources)
- Increase your revision close to prelims and the final exam
- Stick to a revision plan
- Ask for help



Homework

Homework is issued on a regular basis.

Each class will have its own routine for handing in homework but a formal homework will be completed approximately every 2 weeks.

How to help with homework

- Ask to see their homework jotter, we write comments to help
- Encourage them to start a homework exercise well in advance of the due date—don't leave it all to do at the last minute
- Homework is not a test—suggest they use class notes and examples, look up how to do questions on the internet, is there someone they can ask for help from at home (if not they can ask a teacher in school)
- If they say they have no homework they can do corrections using our comments for help, they can re-do previous homework exercises, they can do extra work given by the teacher or from the internet (see section on resources)
